So what's happening now?

Ysgol Cwm Brombil is now the base for child care during lockdown that is required for essential workers and vulnerable families. Each request for child care has been considered on an individual basis. The reason the LEA provided one base school was to lower the number of staff having to travel to different work places. All 5 cluster schools have been locked up and Cwm Brombil has different rooms allocated for different schools. Staff from each of these schools are currently on a rota to supervise the children needing a place on particular days. We have taken equipment there from our school to ensure that there is plenty for them to keep them busy. Families who are unable to walk are provided with transport from the LEA. Children and staff arrive for breakfast and they are also provided with a lunch so no food from outside is taken into the building.
